KEYNOTE ADDRESS A'Lelia Bundles

A'Lelia Bundles is the author of *On Her Own Ground: The Life and Times of Madam C.J. Walker*, a biography of her great-great-grandmother that was named a New York Times Notable Book. She is at work on her fifth book, *The Joy Goddess of Harlem: A'Lelia Walker and the Harlem Renaissance*, about her great-grandmother whose parties and arts patronage helped define the era.

A former network television news executive and Emmy-award winning producer at ABC News and NBC News, Ms. Bundles is a vice chairman of Columbia University's Board of Trustees. She is the brand historian for Madam C. J. Walker Beauty Culture, a line of hair care products manufactured by Sundial Brands and sold exclusively at Sephora.

Ms. Bundles grew up in Indianapolis and attended North Central High School. She founded the Madam Walker Family Archives and is on the advisory boards of the March on Washington Film Festival and the Schlesinger Library on the History of Women in America at Harvard's Radcliffe Institute.

Dr. Tina Heafner served in multiple roles before becoming President of NCSS. She is a member of the editorial boards for *Social Studies and the Young Learner and the Teaching with Primary Sources Journal*. A professor at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, Dr. Heafner has over 28 years of experience as a social studies educator in K-12 schools and as a social studies

methodologist in higher education. She is focused on effective practices in social studies education as well as curriculum and policy issues in social studies. She has two decades of work documenting the national trend of the marginalization of social studies in elementary schools.

Her publications include seven co-authored books, and six edited books, some of which will be available for signing at the conference. She has published numerous articles in peer reviewed journals. She is also the recipient of four research awards from the American Education Research Association for her contributions to the fields of social studies and online learning.




